Purpose	<p>A group where you meet to discuss texts and theory. Reading groups are dependent on its members' commitment and participation. Spending the time on this is worthwhile, as it often deepens your understanding of the text, and forces you to work with the text orally.</p>	<p>A group in which each group member is writing his or her own paper, but meet up to receive feedback on their individual work.</p>	<p>A group that exists shortly to do a small assignment, for instance in the exercise classes.</p>	<p>A group that works with a project for a longer period of time. It often includes creating a project focus, doing empirical work or some type of construction, as well as writing a project paper</p>
Challenges	<p>Make sure that at least two persons read a text – otherwise, you risk adopting any misunderstandings of the text as presented by another person.</p>	<p>Make sure you give constructive criticism: be friendly, constructive and specific.</p>	<p>Participate! If you are part of an assignment group without participating, you risk getting an unfortunate reputation among your co-students.</p>	<p>Project and process management is important, as the project extends throughout an entire semester and require coordination.</p>
