• Changes to specialisations on DIM

- Suggestion to change the specialisations on DIM and make them more flexible for the students introduce "pools of specialisation courses" and individualised specialisations. Inspired by the CS department and the MSc in DDIT programme.
- DIM Faculty and Employers Panel supports the changes.
- Changes to prerequisites for the Service Design specialisation will be made to make it possible for students to take the second part of the specialisation without having taken the first part (course) of the specialisation.
 - Prerequisites will guide students to what specific courses requires the students to do rather than having specific courses that students need to complete before registering for a specialisation course.
- Comments from SATBUSS:
 - How will the level of the courses match each other if students can pick and choose between courses?
 - The level of the courses will not be an issue, since most of the courses are working on the same level but with different prerequisites – so the prerequisites determine the entry point and difficulty rather than an overall level difference depending on which semester the courses are on.
