I used the app Flatmates to find accommodation and facebook is helpful as well – watch out for scammers though. It is easier to find accommodation once you are here and are able to meet up with possible roommates etc. in person. With that said I was lucky to find a great place to stay in Manly whereas others I know had a lot of struggle with moving around and was forced to live in backpacker hostels etc. for several weeks. It is not easy to find a place in Sydney and be prepared for expensive rent that has to be payed weekly or fortnightly. I knew I wanted to live in Manly and didn't mind the commute with the ferry to UTS.

Expenses and Financing

Please comment on expenses connected to your stay abroad:

Sydney is an expensive city, especially in terms of rent and dining out. However, budgeting and meal prepping helped manage costs. Public transport is efficient, and I took advantage of student discounts where possible.

Did you apply for scholarships and would you recommend any ones in particular?

I applied for the Erasmus+ grant and received financial support from ITU's international exchange program. I highly recommend exploring these options early.
