Your stay abroad

What was it like to study at University of Technology Sydney?

Studying at University of Technology Sydney was an incredible experience both academically as well as from a social perspective.

I attended three subject; two business subjects and one IT subject. All of them was of great academic outcome, due to both the professors being very competent, and the structuring of the courses. In both of my business subjects, we were very "hands-on" with concept development of an idea for a company - and more awesome was, that these were focused on sustainable futures, which is indeed an interesting topic these days.

The social life at campus was really good. Almost everyday during my entire semester, activities would occur on the campus atrium in the middle of all the university building. This meant, that there was always a time for fun and games to lighten up the day, that at times could be academically demanding. Occasionally, there would be university parties, which was great fun as well.

Something worth mentioning about University of Technology Sydney is the location. This could not get any better. You are located in downtown Sydney, with the central station stopping right next door (and theres even a direct way from the station to campus). This was especially good for me, since I chose to live in the center of Sydney, so a 10 minute walk to school was all I had to care about in the mornings.

Finally, I would like to give rise to the amazing job done by the university in regards to making sure, that all new students would feel welcome. Initially, they arranged a dozen of activities for us, such that we could meet new people, that were in the similar situation as our selves.
